Dear Colleagues,

Thank you all for your record participation in the 48th Annual Conference (dubbed 50th Anniversary Conference) of SOVE held October 7-11, 2018 at the Tenaya Lodge, Fish Camp-Yosemite National Park, California, I will start with a big thank you to our sponsors, namely Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Clarke, MGK, Central life Sciences, Dr. Mir Mulla, PLOS, Valent BioSciences Corp., ADAPCO, Inc., AMVAC, FMC, UNIVAR, KABS German Mosquito Control, and Dhillon Land Co. Your support did make a big difference, especially with helping out our student attendees. The 50th Anniversary Meeting was dedicated to Dr. Mir S. Mulla for his decades of unparalleled loyalty, service, and support to the Society in its mission to promote vector ecology around the world (see photo on p. 3). The conference proceedings started with a welcome by vice president, Lyle Petersen, followed by a brief awards ceremony by Petersen and SOVE president Lal Mian; announcements by executive director, Major Dhillon; presidential address by Lal Mian; keynote address by William Reisen; and regional reports by Dhillon for the European-SOVE director, Alexandra Chaskopoulou (who could not be available), Rui-De Xue for the Asian SOVE director, Gunter Muller, Latin American director, Paulo Pimenta, and the Indian SOVE director, Ashwani Kumar. This year's awardees for the distinguished achievement award were

Nancy Hinkle and Steve Dobson and those for the distinguished service award were Vicki Kramer and William Van Dyke.

The conference offered 60 oral presentations over 10 symposia that covered diverse topics, ranging from genomics and genetic manipulation to vector-borne zoonotics, emerging vector-borne infections, vector-pathogen interactions, disease outbreaks and trends, CDC regional centers of excellence in vector-borne disease, vector control around the world, and student presentations. The presentations were thorough and shed ample light on some of the cutting-edge research on vector-borne diseases. Besides oral presentations, there were 87 poster displays show -casing research outcomes in vector ecology and control strategies. For the conference attendees most of which came from different parts of the United States, we had some overseas members in attendance as well, representing different areas: Australia, South America (Argentina, Brazil), European Union (Germany, Greece, Lithuania, Romania), and Asia (India, Japan, Thailand).

Besides the main conference, there were other events worthy of mention here. These included our favorite field ecology day trip, first Women in Science initiative (credit Melissa Nolan), and the students meeting (mentored by past-president Mike Kaufman). There was also the annual meeting of the SOVE Board of Directors on October 1 and a SOVE-BOD business meeting on October 10. I was delighted to see some of you at the meeting, showing interest of our membership in the Society's affairs.

The year 2018 marked by the 50th Anniversary Conference went extremely well. Other matters addressed in 2018 included student representation at the Board (Kaufman's initiative), Women in Science initiate (Led by Nolan), andcont'd on p.2






















Presidential Address

Good Morning Everybody and welcome to the 50th Anniversary Conference of the Society for Vector Ecology! Let the celebrations begin with conference dedication first, SOVE history highlights later.

Conference Dedication

On behalf of the Board of the Society for Vector Ecology I am delighted to dedicate

the 50th Anniversary Conference of the SOVE to Dr. Mir S. Mulla for his decades of loyalty, service, and sustained support to the Society in its mission to promote vector ecology around the world.

SOVE History Highlights

1967. Conversation of a professional society among 17 concerned vector ecologists in California, spear-headed by Harvy Magy of Cal Public Health.

1968. On April 19, the group formed the Cal Association of Vector Ecologists (CAVE) with Roy Eastwood as president, Harvy Magy vice president and John Shanafelt as secretary-treasurer. The goal here was to bring together people with different backgrounds (e.g., biologists, entomologists, vector ecologists, epidemiolgists, microbiologists, mammalogists, and civil engineers). As the group solidified, CAVE drafted its By-Laws and Constitution.

1971. President Harvy Magy gave a presentation entitled, "The Genesis and Goals of the Society of Vector Ecologists" at the annual conference of the California Mosquito Control Association (CMCA), held January 25-27, 1971; The presentation was published in the Proceedings and Papers of CMCA in 11/1971. The first meeting of the CAVE was held on March 20, 1971 in Fresno, California with Harvy Magy. In March 1971, CAVE was renamed as the Society of Vector Ecologists (SOVE) with the possibility to expand membership beyond California and abroad, representing different geographical regions although getting enough members by region seemed to be challenging at that time. Later in 1988, its name was changed to the Society for Vector Ecology (keeping the acronym SOVE unchanged) for tax-exempt status for the membership dues and moving further from professional individual interest to promoting the science and education of vector ecology. For more information, refer to Madon and Hopla (2005), the only available reference the SOVE history.¹

SOVE Newsletter (1971-2018)

The SOVE Newsletter was started in 1971, with both John Shanafelt and Minoo Madon voluntarily doing all the information gathering, proofing and printing. The editorship of the Newsletter from 1971-2018, can be summed up by starting with John Shanafelt and Minoo Madon, followed by Roger Nasci, Nancy Hinkle, Mir Mulla, and Lal Mian (2012-present).

Bulletin/Journal of Vector ecology (1974-2018)

The SOVE Bulletin was started in 1974 with Minoo Madon as editor (1974-1982) with help from Major Dhillon, followed by editor Jim Webb 1983-1991; upon Webb's resignation, then associate editor Lal Mian carried out editorial tasks with help from then President Bill Reisen till the selection of Marc Klowden as editor in 1992-present. Marc is assisted by his wife Anne Klowden. Thank you Marc and Anne. The JVE Editorial Board started with Mir Mulla as chair, followed by Woldgridge Foster.

Secretary-Treasurer/Executive Director (1971-2018)

The SOVE secretary-treasurer position was held by John Shanafelt from 1971 to 19 76, followed by Minoo Madon (1977-83), Frank Pelsue (1984-87), Gilbert Challet (1988-1997), and Major Dhillon 1998-present. With the 2017 revision to the by-laws, the secretary-treasurer position was reclassified as executive director to better reflect the duties performed under the new position.

The SOVE Headquarters were stationed at John Shanafelt's home, Orange County, California where John carried out all dayto-day activities from 1968-82. The headquarters were moved to the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District (OCMVCD) in Santa Ana, California in 1982; and were relocated again to the Northwest Mosquito and Vector Control District (NWMVCD) in Corona, California in 1998. It is worthwhile to mention that neither Shanafelt nor any of the two districts ever charged rent for providing office space for the SOVE staff. 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Regional Reports



Dear Friends and Colleagues,

On behalf of the European Society for Vector Ecology, it is my great pleasure to welcome you to the 21st Euro SOVE conference in the beautiful city of Palermo, Sicily.

The primary goal of the Euro SOVE conferences has been to bring together scientists from the field of vector ecology and control, in order to share current research development, enhance networking and increase visibility of everyone's accomplishments. The meetings are always highly informative with diverse presentations, exceptionally great quality of talks, with ample opportunity to socialize with each other while enjoying the local beauties and traditions of our country. So, I am hopeful and confident that the Palermo meeting will meet and surpass everyone's expectations.

We – scientists – have made remarkable progress in the recent years to communicate and network with each other, as evident by the increasing number of collaborative international projects and networking activities. But how active are we in engaging with the public and the policy makers? And when we do, are we using the right "language"? If someone looks at some of the public's perspective on vaccination, GMOs, and global warming, it becomes clear that there is a certain amount of doubt and even fear of science and technology-And how is this relevant to our field? What about the release of sterile and/or transgenic mosquitoes? Or what about the emergency response plans to West Nile virus outbreaks in Greece and with aerial ultra-low volume (ULV) space spray application in Texas? How do the public and regulators perceive these technologies? We say "transgenic mosquitoes," people think "mosquito mutants/monsters." We say "ULV space sprays," they think "spray with carcinogenic chemicals."

Some of this doubt is based on misinformation or may be a consequence of an important communication gap between scientists and society. We are often so caught up in our sci-

entific agenda and the need to excel through publishing that we may neglect or simply not know how to reach out to the public. So how can we strengthen our links with our communication in order to improve their understanding and trust in science and, also, to better prioritize our scientific goals based on social needs? I look forward to address these important questions with all of you.

I would like to extend my deepest gratitude to Alessandra Torina, Major Dhillon, Norbert Becker, Bill Van Dyke, and Michalis Miaoulis for their tremendous contribution in organizing the conference and to all members of the local organizing committee for being such wonderful hosts. 21st Conference of the European SOVE

The 21st Conference of the European SOVE (E-SOVE) themed "Arthropod Vector Science for the Benefit of Societv: Educate, Empathize, Engage," was held October 22-26, 2018 at NH Hotel in Palermo, Italy. The venue and ambience were great for the occasion. The conference was very informative and well-organized with the topics adequately addressing the theme. There were four keynote lectures delivered on different days. Keynote lecture: Gene editing population sex determination pathway for malaria vector control by Andrea Crisanti was given on Monday, October 22; keynote lecture: Insecticide resistance and novel technologies for improving the efficiency and sustainability of mosquito control by John Vontas on Tuesday, October 23; keynote lecture: Tick-pathogen molecular interactions for the control of vector-borne diseases by Jose de la Fuente on Thursday, October 25; and keynote lecture: Integrated Aedes management for the control of Aedes-borne diseases by David Roiz on Friday, October 26. Wednesday, October 24, was a field excursion day for conference participants to network and visit special places of historical and cultural importance in the surrounding areas. The oral scientific presentations, all given in English, were offered in 10 different symposia: Symposium 1: Vector ecology and behavior I; Symposium 2: Vector ecology and behavior II; Symposium 3: Vector-pathogen interactions; Symposium 4: Reaching out to society, bridging research and policy, and practice for solving real-life vector-borne problems; Symposium 5: Novel vector control tool I; Symposium 6: Novel vector control tools II; Symposium 7: Vector networks and projects: An update; Symposium 8: Emerging and re-emerging vectorborne diseases; Symposium 9: Invasive vector species: Surveillance and management strategies I; and Symposium 10: Invasive vector species: Surveillance and management strategies II. In addition, there were 92 poster presentations displayed over two sessions, Tuesday and Thursday. The conference was attended by 191 registrants from 27 countries representing 5 continents with a majority Europeans (88%).

On the opening day, the plenary session was moderated by Marieta Braks in place of Alexandra Chaskopoulou. The session started with a welcome by the Local Arrangement Committee Chair, Alessandra Torina who next introduced and translated Ing. Antonio Sala, Palermo City Mayor's Office, for his address welcoming the conference delegates to Palermo. The SOVE Executive Director, Major Dhillon made some announcements and was followed by a Presidential Address by the SOVE President Lal Mian who went over the history of ESOVE and the parent SOVE celebrating its 50th Anniversary.

On Friday, October 26, the final day of the conference, the official welcome was made by Silvio Borrello, Chief Veterinary Officer, Italian Ministry of Health, followed by Salvatore Seminara, General Director and Santo Caracappa, Health Director of the Instituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale della Sicilia.

During the last hours of the conference, Bill Van Dyke (NWMVCD) gave an exciting and thought-provoking talk entitled, "Vector Control for the Benefit of Society: Educate, Empathize, Engage" before the last presentation, *Aedes aegypti* in Europe: Past, Present and Future by William Wint. After some final announcements by Alessandra and Marieta, the SOVE President thanked the participants and declared the conference as closed.

Send money for overseas regions Presidential Recognition Award

4. **Approval of Minutes:** A motion made by Mulligan to approve the minutes of the October 1, 2017 Board meeting held in Mallorca, Spain as presented, and seconded by Kaufman, passed unanimously.

5. Committee Reports:

A. Publications

Journal of Vector Ecology, Klowden pointed out that his report is attached with the agenda documents. He discussed some salient points of the report such as the number of manuscripts received by region; he also indicated the JVE impact factor standing at 1.4. He further discussed the lack of reviewers for manuscripts. Several suggestions were made to recruit reviewers. Nolan suggested giving reviewers discounts for publishing in JVE. McGregor said to recruiting students for reviewers. Kumar suggested announcing the need for reviewers in the general session. Klowden also reported that a program is available to check plagiarism and Wiley has made it available to us free of charge.

Continuous publication: Klowden recommended not to pursue this as Wiley was unable to do so. The Board agreed with Klowden. Klowden also reported that lots of overseas manuscripts are very poorly written and he has to spend lots of time to review and rewrite them. He asked about new rates for such manuscripts. Several ideas were discussed. It was the general conclusion of the Board that we ask the students to review such papers and rewrite in a manner which is in the right format to be sent to reviewers. This will require the authors to pay students.

Newsletter:

Newsletter Editor Lal Mian thanked everybody, especially the Directors for submitting their reports and news. He indicated that the student page was excellent. Peterson asked about the metrics about news-letter reading. Van Dyke will report to this.

B. Membership:

C. Regional Reports:

1. Dhillon reported that ESOVE Director, Alexandra Chaskopoulou, could not attend the meeting due to the sudden death of her father and he requested a moment of silence. The Board held a moment of silence in memory of Alexandra's father. The Board also conveyed their condolences to Alexandra. In Chaskopoulou's absence, Dhillon reported that the ESOVE meeting will be held in Palermo, Italy on October 22 – 26 at the NH Hotel; and so far, there have been 164 people registered.

Paulo Pimenta reported on the Brazilian SOVE meeting, which was held along with MedTrop meeting in Recife. It was attended by approximately 120 people. He recommends to change the name of Brazilian SOVE to Latin American SOVE. He said that he attended the meeting in Mendoza, Argentina where Christina McCarthy helped him to recruit over 30 members. He stated that hopefully we would hold the Latin American SOVE conference in La Plata, Argentina next year.

Nolan suggested that we should explore other South American countries.

Kumar apologized that he could not hold the Indian SOVE region meeting earlier this year due to unforeseen circumstances. He reported 42 members, with 11 serving on the advisory board and 7 members on executive committee. The website is ready and working. The meeting will be held February 13 - 17, 2019 in Goa, India. The venue is already booked and we already they have been offered some sponsorships. He described the various awards and their criteria. He also requested seed money for the meeting. Rudy Xue discussed the details of the Asian SOVE meeting.

David Sullivan reported that Montana has its first case of Lyme disease.

2. Renaming of Regions: *Motion made by Mulligan andseconded by Xue to change the name of Brazilian Region to Latin American Region. Passed unanimously.* Indian Region - No change was recommended

D. Awards:

Peterson reported that the achievement award recipients were Nancy Hinkle and Steve Dobson and service award recipients Vicki Kramer and another individual who would be named at the award ceremony.

6. Financial Report:

A. Financial Statement 2017: Dhillon discussed the details of the financial report. Motion made by Kumarand seconded by Peterson to approve the financial report as presented, passed unanimously.

B. CD Investments: SOVE has three CD's in the amount of \$111,957.77.

As CD investments were discussed under Financial Report, no further discussion was necessary.

C. Euro SOVE account: Dhillon reported about experiencing difficulties with ESOVE account in Germany, being misguided by the Deutsch Bank in setting up the account. Bill Van Dyke and Norbert Becker were working with Deutsch Bank and PayPal to resolve the issue, hopefully resolving it in January. Dhillon further reported to have approximately 40,000 Euros in the PayPal account and 31,000 Euros in Deutsch Bank. Becker has transferred 27,000 Euros to pay the first invoice for the ESOVE conference. He recommended that the Board authorize Van Dyke and Becker to resolve the issues with both Deutsch Bank and Paypal. *Motion made Sullivan and seconded by Achee to authorize Norbert Becker and Bill Van Dyke to resolve the money transfer and find out the best way possible to open an account in Europe for ESOVE conferences, passed unanimously.*

Dhillon further stated that we have enough money in Deutsch Bank and Paypal accounts to pay the expenses of ESOVE conference in Palermo, but we will not have access to the Paypal funds till January 15, 2019. Bill Van Dyke reported that Paypal assured him that they will allow him to transfer all the funds in Paypal account to Deutsch Bank. Since there will not be enough money in the Deutsch Bank account to satisfy all of the invoices, he recommends that all remaining invoices be paid by funds in SOVE in America. The Board agreed that this will be the best solution when Paypal allows to transfer the funds then SOVE will be reimbursed by ESOVE funds. *Motion by Ashwani Kumar to authorize Executive Director to pay the ESOVE invoices from SOVE account in a timely manner, seconded by Nicole Achee. Passed unanimously.* The Board authorized Dhillon not to exceed the amount over \$50,000.00 and for additional money, if necessary, seek a reauthorization from the Board.

- 7. Annual Conferences:
- 8. A. The Board directed Dhillon to get proposals from Puerto Rico for holding the 2019 conference. Dhillon stated the proposals are received, they will be presented to the Board for selecting a hotel.
 - **B.** The Board has authorized Dhillon to get proposals from Hawaii for the 2020 annual conference.
- 8. 8th International Congress: After a short discussion, Ulrich Bernier recommended that SOVE hold the Congress in Charleston, South Carolina. *Executive Director Dhillon made the motion and seconded by Sullivan to hold the International Congress in Charleston in 2021, passed unanimously.*

9. Recommendation:

A. Dhillon stated that he has served SOVE for 22 years and he will retire at the end of this year. He stated that Van Dyke has been helping him for the last 3 years and has done 90% of the work for the conference. Bill is very knowledgeable about SOVE and currently is our webmaster. He is very familiar with the SOVE's issues and activities. He, therefore, recommended Van Dyke to be appointed as the new Executive Director. After a short discussion, *a motion made by Mulligan and seconded by Rudy Xue to appoint Bill Van Dyke Executive Director as of January 1, 2019, passed unanimously.*

B. Motion made by Rudy Xue and seconded by David Sullivan to authorize Bill Van Dyke to be co-signer on all SOVE accounts and financial investments, passed unanimously.

C. Dhillon stated that he would like to help other regions especially ESOVE to set up the next meeting in Europe and requested funds to pay for travel expenses.

Motion made by Mulligan and seconded Achee to: Grant a title of Executive Director Emeritus to Major Dhillon and to Authorize Major Dhillon to continue to be co-signer on SOVE bank accounts and to Authorize funds not to exceed \$5,000.00 for Major Dhillon's travel expenses to set up ESOVE and other regional meetings, *all motions passed unanimously*.

10. Student representative on SOVE Board: Michael Kaufman thanked Bethany McGregor for attending the Board meeting and recommended to add a Student Board Member representing students. Dhillon stated that it would require a By-Laws change. *Motion made by Nolan and seconded by David Sullivan to add a student Board Member to the SOVE Board and amend By-laws as necessary to reflect this in other changes to the By-Laws, passed unanimously.*

Mian appointed Kaufman, Mulligan, Achee and Nolan for a committee to develop criteria for student representation on the Board.

- 11. Three minute talk by special selected posters/presentations: In the interest of time, the Board tabled this issue.
- 12. Appointment of North Eastern Board Member: Dhillon reported that with Isik Unlu moving to Florida, North Eastern Region needed to appoint a Regional Director. Mian was authorized to appoint a Director to replace Unlu.

13. Contracts:

1. Valerie Montigny's contract: On Dhillon's recommendation, a *motion was made by Mulligan and* seconded by Kaufman to renew the contract of Valerie Montigny for an annual amount of \$14,500.00. After a short discussion, the motion was amended and seconded by Mulligan and Kaufman to approve the contract with Valerie Montigny for \$15,000.00 for 2019, passed unanimously.

2. Honorarium for Marian Shannon: Dhillon stated that Marian Shannon assisted Valerie Montigny in keeping the financial books in order and to provide other services to SOVE. He recommended \$1,000.00 honorarium for Marian Shannon. A *motion made by Mulligan and seconded by Kumar to grant \$1,000.00 honorarium for Marian Shannon, passed unanimously.*

14. Budget approval: After a short discussion, a motion by Rudy Xue and seconded by Kaufman to approve the budget with changes to Valerie Montigny's contrac, passed unanimously.

15. New items to agenda:

A. Seed Money: Dhillon gave a background on seed money, which was set up to provide financial support to ESOVE region in case the region needed money in the initial stages of organizing the conference. ESOVE has used the money and returned in full one time and approximately 90% the second time. Since the mechanism was set up to help ESOVE and at that time there were no other regions, it will be proper to offer the seed money to any other regions as well. A *motion made by Mulligan and seconded by Rudy Xue to authorize Executive Director in consultation with the President to transfer funds not to exceed \$5,000.00 to any region, which requests financial help, passed unanimously.*

- 16. Board Member Comments: Pimenta recommended to give a Young Scientist award. After some discussion, Mian appointed Pimenta, Achee, Bernier and McGregor to a committee to formulate some rules/mechanisms to grant this award.
- 17. New Officers Announcement: Dhillon reported that Isik Unlu has been elected as the new Vice President of SOVE.
- 18. Adjournment: Mian adjourned the meeting at 6:55 PM.

Vector Brief Southern California Invasive Mosquito Update by Angela Caranci acaranci@northwestmvcd.org

As the busy breeding season came to an end in 2018, leaders of vector control agencies in southern California made a concerted effort to organize an Invasive Aedes Forum. As an attendee and relatively new transplant to the region, this forum presented a prime opportunity to interface with professionals and colleagues who have been ferociously fighting back the invading onslaught of several species of Aedes, some since 2011 and others still waiting anxiously, almost expectantly. Having moved from the Mid-Atlantic region, I was all too familiar with the bite pressure associated with these highly anthropophagic pests and could quickly commiserate with my new neighbors as they experience bites, and associated dermal reactions, unlike anything they recall from the invasive Aedes-free California they knew and loved. Through the end of 2018, 7 of 10 counties in southern California had reported the presence of Ae. aegypti, with five of those same counties also reporting presence of Ae. albopictus and fewer still reporting the presence of Ae. notoscriptus. Locally-transmitted, human cases of Zika in California have not yet been attributed to transmission via mosquito vectors and the number of travel-related cases have dropped precipitously since 2015-2016, from the peak of more than 500 annual cases down to only 62 confirmed cases in 2018. However, the threat of emerging vector-borne disease globally necessitates that surveillance of these important vector species remains a priority. This is the context with which regional representatives collected at the Invasive Aedes Forum to discuss administrative, surveillance, and control strategies specific to the local ecology, where reported breeding sources have occasionally been atypical and in a climate that can be unfavorable for truckmounted control applications. However, among all the guided, break-out discussions, an important theme emerged time and again. Communication and engagement with the public throughout this region

must be the foundation to coordinate control of this group of vectors, possibly even more so than more familiar vector groups that our agencies target. The container-inhabiting nature of these species often creates logistical concerns in implementing control methods, with some agencies having allocated 60 minutes per property inspection upon request for service. This inspection time, coupled with up to 90% of service requests related to possible Aedes activity in 2018, could quickly lead to an unsustainable service model, a reality all too familiar to other regions where these species are established. From my perspective, a major agenda item going forward is the potential coordination among agencies throughout the region to work toward creating broad-level, educational messaging to bring the public up to date and develop adequate expectations of service that control agencies can provide, particularly while the threat of West Nile virus transmission looms large. As with all programs, science-based decision making must feed our response policies but engaging with residents to share the science of invasive Aedes surveillance and control methods is paramount and we look forward to developing improved messaging.

BEI Resources – Vector Resources, beyond the microbes

The Biological and Emerging Infections Resources Program (BEI Resources) was developed by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) as a centralized bioresource for research reagents to the scientific community (www.beiresources.org) The primary role of BEI Resources is the acquisition and authentication of several categories of materials for registered scientists, with a focus on emerging and re-emerging infectious diseases.

BEI Resources has built a large repository of materials available to the vector resource community free of charge. The resources include over 60 colonies of mosquitoes as well as adult and larval ticks, sand flies, and triatomines. These vectors are competent hosts for transmission of blood-borne arbovirus, parasitic and rickettsial diseases including Dengue, Zika, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, Lyme borreliosis, Chagas and malaria. The Vector Resources page hosts freely-downloadable insectary protocol manuals for each of these vector species, providing a rich array of insectary management, safety and experimental approaches for Vector Biology. These resources are available free of charge (shipping and handling may apply) to REGISTERED users in domestic and foreign institutions and NIH grant funding is not required. For information on all vector resources for researchers provided by DMID, visit the DMID Resources for Researchers website.

BEI Resources would like to highlight phlebotomine sand flies resources for leishmaniasis, bartonellosis, and papatasi fever research. BEI Resources and NIAID have an established partnership with the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research to distribute a limited number of Sand Fly Larval Pots and Adult flies to qualified researchers. All vectors are competent for transmission studies. This valuable and limited resource will be offered to qualified researchers to promote the research and development of products to reduce the risk of vector-borne diseases.
